Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year for 1991

This notebook began as a tithing record for Barbara Allen shortly after she married on October 2, 1895. Tithing was paid in two ways. Farmers paid a tenth of everything they made or produced – the tenth calf born or the tenth colt. The other method was for those who worked for wages who then paid one tenth of their wages.

Mother evidently made butter and traded it for other goods, because she paid one pound of butter worth 20 cents, and the next year three pounds for 65 cents.

Grandpa Allen gave Dad 20 acres of land on the southwest corner of Stapley and Broadway, and he bought a few cows. The milk was sold to the creamery for which they received cash and dutifully paid their tenth. On their livestock, they paid on increased value and the tenth calf, etc.

Dad went on a mission to the Southern States when Blanche was a baby, leaving Mother with ten cows to milk, 20 acres to irrigate, and two babies to tend. With the help of her mother and sisters, she paid her tithing, paid off their debts, and saved enough money to meet Dad in Cache, Utah, a town settled by Grandpa Allen and his brothers. They

visited cousins there for a few weeks.

When they got home, Dad bought a larger farm and more cows then left for his next mission to the Eastern States in 1908-09. With the help of Ashael, 14; Blanche, 12; they milked 20 cows, farmed 60 acres, and tended six children. Gove was three months old when he left. One of Mother's sisters stayed with her most of the time.

Back to the notebook. The dates after the cow's names record the birth of calves. I think you can make out the rest of it. If not, ask Uncle Joe, who is a dairyman and should know what it is all about.

I hope you enjoy reading this as much as I did when I found it in a hidden pocket in the back of Mother's billfold. I hadn't seen it before.

Also in the book is a copy of two little cards, one that Mother received when she was 13 years old for her Sunday School attendance. The other is a Christmas Card from Ben E. Rich, Grandpa's mission president in both the Eastern States and the Southern States missions.


