## SOLDIER'S LETTER

HOW PRIVATE W. SMALE WAS  
KILLED.

Writing to Mrs. Emily Smale, Upper Freestone, from Quinn's Post, Gallipoli, on August 8, Lieut.-Col. R. M. Stolarz, commanding 2nd L.I. Regiment A.I.F., in communicating the sad news of the death in action of Private W. E. Smale, said:

"It is with very deep regret that I have to write and inform you of the death of your son, Private W. E. Smale, on the morning of the 5th August. Heavy fighting was in progress, and part of the regiment was trying to capture a Turkish trench. Your son gallantly left the trenches for the charge, and died a soldier's death. I desire to express my sympathy with you and his relatives in your great loss."

Private C. Stanley, writing from Ward 114, Military Hospital, Floriana, Malta, to Mrs. Smale on 21th August last, says:—"I wish to write to you a few lines to give you a fuller and better description of the circumstances in which your son (my comrade) fell. Though I am myself, at present, put out of action by the explosion of a shell, and am unable to speak, I can now write a better account than the hurried one I sent last, as it was written in the trenches during a brief respite from fighting. Your son was killed at Quinn's Post, at Gaba Tepe, and he was in the very forefront of the line. The reason of this was that he was a bomb thrower, whose job was to throw bombs into the enemy's trenches, to give the men with the bayonets a chance to get a footing. He was picked for this because of his good throwing powers. He could hurl a bomb 50 yards and hit the trench nearly every time. He had to do this on the day of the charge. With others he had to climb out of our trenches and run to the enemy's, carrying 10 or 12 bombs, in the face of a very heavy fire. He died on the parapet of the enemy's trench, a brave man to the last, but his death was avenged tenfold, for although we lost some men, the Turks suffered very heavily that day. I was wounded two days later, being blown up by a shell. Luckily, I have no serious wounds, but I have lost the use of both legs, and am also dumb. The doctor says that he will operate upon me, and that I will be able to speak in a few weeks' time. I hope you will accept my sympathy for the loss of one who was always a good soldier and comrade, always cheerful and bright, even under the most trying circumstances, and whose loss is felt by all who came in contact with him. I feel his loss specially myself, as he was my only mate. I made a solemn promise that I would

sell, as he was my only mate. I made a solemn promise that I would write to all his people, whose addresses he gave me. Hoping that you will be able to bear his loss with fortitude."

The reason of this was that he was a bomb thrower, whose job was to throw bombs into the enemy's trenches, to give the men with the bayonets a chance to get a footing. He was picked for this because of his good throwing powers. He could hurl a bomb 50 yards and hit the trench nearly every time. He had to do this on the day of the charge. With others he had to climb out of our trenches and run to the enemy's, carrying 10 or 12 bombs, in the face of a very heavy fire. He died on the parapet of the enemy's trench, a brave man to the last, but his death was avenged tenfold, for although we lost some men, the Turks suffered very heavily that day. I was wounded two days later, being blown up by a shell. Luckily, I have no serious wounds, but I have lost the use of both legs, and am also dumb. The doctor says that he will operate upon me, and that I will be able to speak in a few weeks' time. I hope you will accept my sympathy for the

loss of one who was always a good soldier and comrade, always cheerful and bright, even under the most trying circumstances, and whose loss is felt by all who came in contact with him. I feel his loss specially myself, as he was my only mate. I made a solemn promise that I would write to all his people, whose addresses he gave me. Hoping that you will be able to bear his loss with fortitude."
