HOW PRIVATE W. SMALE WAS KILLED.

Writing to Mrs. Family Smale, I pper Pressione, from Quinn's Post. Gallipoli, on August 8, Lieut Col. R. M. Sto-lart. commanding 2nd 1.11 Regiment A.I.F., in communicating the sail news of the death in action of Private W. E.
