BISTORY OF LOSENZO BARGECK.

LOGENTO BABCOCK SON OF POLPHUS AND JENUSHA ROWLHY PAPCOCK, WAS BORD 22 DECEMBER AT MINA CHIQ. COUNTY NEW YORK. WHEN HIS FATHER AND MOTHER WEPE CONVERTED TO THE CHUPCH OF JESUS CEPIST OF LATER MAY SAINTS IN 1823 LOSENZO WAS TEN YEARS CLD, THEY THEN MOVED TO CALLWELL, ILLINOIS, HE LATER WENT WITH HIS PARENTS INTO NAUVOO, HANCOCK, HILINOIS.

IT WAS HERE HE HET AND MARRIED ANY AND MARRILE IN 1864 AT THE AGE OF TWENTY ONE. AMY AND WAS BORN 14 FEBRUARY 1826 AT HUNTSBURG, GRAUGE COUNTY, ONIO TO MATHANIEL AND POLLY KING MARBLE. THEY WERE IN NAUVOO WHEN THE SAINTS WERE COMPELED TO LEAVE, THEY CAMPED ON THE BANK OF THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER WITH THE RIVER SEPERATING THEM AND NAUVOO.

THEIR FIRST CHILD WAS LISTED AS BEING BORN IN NAUVOO 27 FEBRUARY 1946. AFTER PEPAFING THEIR EQUIPMENT AND MAKING READY FOR THE LONG TRIP ACROSS THE PLAIN. THEY LEFT
FOR A PLACE THEY COULD WORSHIP AS THEY PLEASED WITH OUT A MOB PERSECUTION, AT THIS
TIME NO ONE KNEW WHERE THIS PLACE MIGHT BE FOUND, EPIGHAM YOUNG SAID: "WE WILL NOT
STOP UNTIL WE FIND THE PLACE."

THE NEXT WE HEAR ABOUT THEM THEY WERE IN COUNCIL BLUFF, JONA (WINTER QUAPTERS.)
THEN CAME THE FAMOUS BURDS OF CAPIAIN ALLEN OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY WHICH WERE AS
FOLLOWS: "I HAVE COME ANONG YOU, INSIFUCTED BY COLONEL S. F. KRARNEY OF THE UNITED
STATES ARMY, NOW COMMANDING THE ARMY OF THE WEST, TO VISIT THE MORMON CAMPS, AND ACCEPT THE SERVICE, FOR TWELVE MONTHS, OF FOUR OR FIVE COMPANYS OF MORMON MEN WHO WILL
BE WILLING TO SERVE THEIR COUNTRY FOR THAT PERIOD IN OUR PRESENT WAR WITH MEXICO;
THIS FORCE WILL UNITE WITH THE ARMY OF THE WEST AT SANTA FE, AND BE MARCHED THENCE
TO CALIFORNIA, WHERE THEY WILL BE DISCHARGED. THEY WILL RECIEVE PAY AND RATIONS,
AND OTHER ALLOWANCES, SUCH AS VOLUNTEERS OR REGULAR SOLDIERS RECIEVE, FROM THE BAY
THEY SHALL BE MUSTERED INTO THE SERVICE, AND WILL BE ENTITLED TO ALL COMPORTS AND
HENEFITS OF THE REGULAR ARMY." AS YOU READ THIS REMEMBER THESE LAST WORDS OF CAPIAIN
ALLEN. LOPENZO VOLUNTEERED AT THIS TIME INTO THE SERVICE OF THE MORMON SATTALION
NOT KNOWING THE PERSECUTION THAT WAS IN STORE FOR THEN FROM THE REGULAR ARMY.

LORENZO MADE ARANGMENTS FOR HIS FAMILY TO BE TAKEN CARE OF IN HIS ABSENTS, THEY STARTED ON THE FIRST LEG OF THEIR JOUPNEY, AT NOON OF 21 JULY 1846 THEY LEFT COUNCIL BLUFF FOR FORT LEAVENGORTE, KANSA.

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HISTORY OF LOPENZO BARCOCK, COMPILED BY ELVES E. EAPOY.

THESE MEN HAD TRAVELED MILES ILL EQUIPED AND HUNGRY, AFTER LEAVING THEIR HOMES IN NAUVOO WITH WHAT LITTLE THEY COULD CARRY IN WHAT FEW WAGONS THEY HAD, HOW COULD ONE KEEP THEIR PATIENCE AFTER SUCH A ORDEALY BUT THE BATTALION DID, SEPTER THEY HAD TRAVELED FAR THEY FOUND WHAT THEY WERE TO PUT UP WITH, FROM THE START THE OFFICERS OF THE ARMY STARTED THEIR PERSECUTIONS OF THE BATTALION, THEY SUFFERED HUNGER, EXPOSURE, AND ABUSE BY THE OFFICERS, WHEN THEY BECAME SICK THEY WERE ADMINISTERD A GARGING DOSE OF ARSENIC AND COLONEL, BY THE BATTALION SUPGEON DOCTOR GEORGE SANDEPSON WHO SOON WAS KNOWN AS DOCTOR DEATH BY THE BATTALION.

WHEN THEY APPIVED IN SANTA FE, THEY HAD SEVENTY THREE SICK ON THEIR HANDS, WHICH THEY SENT BACK TO PUEBLO FOR THE WINTER. CAPTAIN ALLEN HAD TAKEN ILL IN LEAVENWORTH AND WAS LEFT THERE FOR HIS RECOVERY, BUT THEY RECIEVED WORD CAPTAIN ALLEN WAS DEAD. THE MEN LIKED AND RESPECTED CAPTAIN ALLEN AS HE DID THEM, HIS DEATH WAS A HEART BREAK TO THE BATTALION FOR NOW THEY WERE LEFT WITH OUT ANY HELP FROM THE ARMY.

THE FARTHER THEY WENT THE TOUGHER IT GOT, THEIR RATIONS HAD BEEN CUT SEVERAL TIMES, THE MEN WERE WORN OUT, THEIR FEET WAS GETTING BARE, THEY HAD LITTLE OUTER CLOTHING, WITH SO LITTLE TO EAT THE WINTER WINDS SEENED TO PENATRATE THEIR BONES. THEY WOULD KE EAT THEIR OWN ONEN THAT HAD BECAME TO POOR AND WEARY TO TRAVEL, MANY OF THE MEN WERE DYING FROM EXPOSURE AND HARDSHIP, AND THROUGH THE MURDERIOUS DRUGING OF DOCTOR SANDERSON. A NUMBER OF THE BATTALION TOOK SICK WITH CHILLS AND FEVER, AND WAS ADMINISTERED MEDICATION BY DOCTOR DEATH FROM A OLD IRON SPOON WHICH HE HAD AQUIPED SOME WHERE IN HIS TRAVELS, AFTER THIS IT WAS CUSTOMARY FOR THE SICK TO BE MARCHED TO THE TUNE OF "JIN ALONG JOE" TO THE DOCTORS QUAPTERS, FOR THEIR PORTION FROM THE OLD IRON SPOON, AND AS ALWAYS THE SAME OLD BOSE OF COLONEL AND ARSENIC. WORD GOT AFOUND THE DOCTOR THOUGHT A NEW SPOON WOULD BE TO GOOD FOR THE MORMONS, I SWEAR THE OLD IPON SPOON APPEARS IN THE BATTALION HISTORY AS THE MEN THEN SELVES.

AFTER TRAVELING THREE HUNDPED MILES BEYOND PUBBLO THERE WAS FIFTY FIVE MORE SICK TO BE SENT BACK TO PUBBLO, AMONG THESE MEN WAS LORENZO.

ON THE TENTH OF HOUSTBER EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND FORTY SIX THE SIGK WAS ORDERED BACK TO PUBELO FOR THE EDMAINDER OF THE WINTER. THEY WAS PUT UNDER THE COMMAND OF LIEUTEN-TANN WILLIS. HISTORY OF LORENZO BABCOOK. COMPILED BY ELVEN E. HARDY.

THE COLONEL ORDERD THAT THEY BE GIVEN TWENTY SIX DAYS RATION, ALLOWING TEN OUNCES OF FLOUR PER DAY, (RIGHTEEN BEING THE USAL SOLDIERS RATIONS) THROUGH SOME OVER SIGHT IN THE LOADING THIS AMOUNT WAS NOT TAKEN, LIEUTENTANT WILLIS WRITES:

"ACTIVE PREPARATIONS NOW COMMENCED TO CARRY EFFECT THE COLONELS OFDERS, AND BY FOUR OCLOCK OF THE SAME DAY HAD COLLECTED OF INVALIDS FIFTY SIX ONE BIG GOVERNMENT WAGON, FOUR YOKE OF POOR CATTLE, FIVE DAYS RATIONS AND TWO DRESSED SHEEP, AS FOOD FOR THE SICK. OUR LOADING FOR THE ONE WAGON CONSISTED OF THE CLOTHING, FIVE DAYS RATIONS, BLANKETS, COOKING UTENSILS, TENT AND TENT POLES, MUSKETS, EQUIPAGE, AND PROVISIONS, AND ALL INVALIDS WHO WERE UNABLE TO MALK, WITH SCHEDIFFICULT I OBTAINED A SPADE OR TWO AND A SHOVEL, BUT WAS PROVIDED WITH NO MEDICINEES OR OTHER NECESSARIES FOR THE SICK EXCEPT THE MUTTON BEFORE REFERD TO, AND ONLY FIVE DAYS PATIONS TO TRAVEL NEAR THREE HUNDRED MILES".

THUS ARRIED AND EQUIPED THEY COMMENCED THEIR LONSONE MARCH, RETEACING THEIR STEPS BACK TO SANIA FE. THEY MARCHED THE SAME DAY ABOUT TWO NILES AND WAS VISITED BY CAPT.

NUNT AND OTHERS, WHO SPOKE WORDS OF COMPORT TO THEM ADMINISTERING THE CHURCH ORDINANCES TO THE SICK, IN PIDDING THEM GOD SPEED THEY LEFT THE NEXT DAY. THEY RESUMED THEIR MARCH, CAMPING IN THE EVENINGS NEAR SOME SPRING. ONE YOKE OF OXEN GOT MIRED IN THE MUD, THEY TOOK OFF THE YOKE AND GOT ONE OUT, THE OTHER THEY UNDERTOOK TO PULL OUT WITH A POPE AND UNFORTANATELY DROKE ITS NECK. THEIR TEAM WAS NOW TO WEAK FOR THEIR LOAD.

THEY KNEW NOT MHAT TO DO FOR A TEAM, IT WAS A DARK TIME, AND MANY WERE THE PRAYERS
THAT WENT TO OUR FATHER IN HEAVEN FOR DEVINE AID, THE NEXT MORNING THEY FOUND WITH \$
THEIR OKEN THO SPLENDID YOUNG STEERS, THEY LOOKED ON IT AS ONE OF THE PROVIDENCES OF
OUR FATHER IN HEAVEN. THEY CONTINUED THEIR MARCH TO ALBUQUEEQUE, WHERE CAPTAIN BURVIN
GAVE THEM FIVE DELLARS IN CASH, AND THE PRIVILAGE OF EXCHANGING THEIR HEAVY WAGON FOR
A LIGHT ONE. THEY REACHED SANTA FE. ABOUT NOVEMBER THE TWENTY FIFTH, HERE THEY OBTAINED
FROM THE QUARTERMASTER TEN MULES AND PACK SADDLES, ROPES AND OTHER THINGS NECESSARY
FOR PACKING. THE NEXT DAY THEY TRAVELED ABOUT TWENTY MILES AND CAMPED BY A BEAUTIFUL
STREAM WHERE THEY HAD TO LEAVE ONE OF THEIR BROKEN DOWN MULES.

THEY CONTINUED THERE MARCH FROM DAY TO DAY, TRAVELING THROUGH SNOW FROM TWO TO POUR FEET DEEP, WITH COLD AND PIERCING WINDS. BEFORE REACHING THE TOP OF THE MOUNTAIN LIEUTENTANT WILLIS DEFAILED A REAR GUARD OF THE MOST ABLED MEN TO AID AND ENGQURAGE THOSE WHO BEGAN TO LAG BEHIND, AND FELT UNABLE TO PROCEED FARTHER WHILE OTHERS HE MARCHED AT THE HEAD OF THE COLUNE TO BREAK TRAIL THROUGH THE DEEP SNOW BANKS, AFTER SEVERE FROST BITES AND GREAT EXERTION THEY SUCCEEDED TO THE TOP. THEY LOOKED INTO THE VALLEY OF THE ARKANSAS BELOW WHERE THE GROUND WAS BARE. THE DROOPING SPIRITS OF THE MEN CAME TO LIFE, TREY NOON DECEMBED TO THE PLAINS BELOW, WHERE THEY WERE COMPARATIVELY COMPORTABLE. FROM EDEC THEY HAD GOOD TRAVELING AND PLEASANT WEATHER TO PURELO, THEY ARRIVED IN PUEBLO 24 DECEMBER 1846.

THEY LEFT PUBBLO THE FOLLOWING SPRING ON JUNE THIRTED THE EIGHTESN BUNDRED AND FORTY SEVEN. ON THE NIGHT OF 16 JUNE 1947 THEY WERE CAMPED WITH IN ONE HILE OF FORT LAR-ANIE, ABOUT FIVE BUNDRED AND FORTY HILES WEST OF COUNCIL BLUFF.

MHEN IN LARANIE THEY FOUND ERIGHAN YOUNG WITH HIS PARTY OF PIONEERS WERE MAKING
THEIR WAY WESTWARD, THEY HAD PASSED THERE JUST TWELVE DAYS SEPORE. WITH A VIEW OF
OVERTAKING THEM THEY MADE A EARLY START ON THE SEVENTEENTH AND FOLLOWED THEIR TRAIL.
THE BOAD WAS BAD, ALMOST EMPASSABLE IN PLACES, THIS MADE THE TRAVELING NECESSABILY
SLOW AND TEDIOUS; THEY GRADUALLY GAINED ON THE PHONEERS, WHOSE JOURNEYING THEY LEARNED
BY FINDING A POST SET AT A CAMPING PLACE, WITH WRITING ON IT, SHOWING WHEN THEY HAD
PASSED THERE. THEY GAINED WITHIN A DAY OF THE PHONEERS, THEY HAD TO HAVE THEIR ANIMALS SHOED, THIS DELAYED THEN SO THEY ARRIVED IN THE SALT LAKE VALLEY THREE DAYS LATED
ON 27 JULY 1847.

WHEN LOREIZO RECIEVED HIS DISCHARGE, HE HADE READY TO RETURN TO COUNCIL MUFF FOR HIS FAMILY. WHILE HE WAS EMBOUTE TO COUNCIL BLUFF HIS SON DIED ON 9 AUGUST 1947.

THE HISTORY OF JUAN COUNTY STATES: "LORENZO BARCOCK RETURNED WITH HIS FAMILY IN 1848," I HAVE TO DISAGREE WITH THIS; THEY HAD THEIR SECOND CHILD IN HISSOURI IN 1948, I BELIEVE THEY RETURNED TO UTAM IN 1852 OR THERE BOUTS. NEVER THE LESS HE SETTLED IN MONA, JUAN COUNTY, UTAM, HE HAD A SIG HAND IN THE SETTLING OF MONA.

LORDAZO SCENED TO LIVE IN MOST PLACES IN THE STATE FROM SPANISH FORK SOUTH MAND.

HISTORY OF LORENZO DABCOCK.

LORENZO AND HIS WIFE WENT TO PRICE SHORTLY AFTER PRICE WAS CLASSED A TOWN RATHER THAN A OUTPOST. THEY LIVED THERE SOME TIME, THEN LORENZO RECIEVED HIS PENSION FOR SERVICE IN THE MORMON BATTALION. ANY ANN MARBLE BALCOCK MUST HAVE DIED WHILE LIVING THERE OR THERESOUTS, I HAVE SEEN TOLD BY SEVERAL PROFILE THE DIED AT PRICE AND WAS BURLED IN THE OLD PRICE COMETERN, I HAVE FOUND NO RECORD STATING SUCH.

AFTER LORENZO WAS CRANTED HIS PENSION OF THIRTY SIX COLLARS EVERY THREE MONTHS, HE MOVED BACK TO MONA. HIS FIRST CHECK WAS FOR FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS, HE SCHIT MOST OF THIS IN PROSPECTING MORTH EAST OF MONA. HE PUBLI A CABIN ON THE SIDE OF THE CANYON WHICH HE CALLED HOME, HE LIVED THERE FOR MANY YEARS.

WHEN HE SECAME TIRED OF PROSPECTING HE WOULD GO INTO MONA AND VISIT HIS RELATIVES FOR A WHILE, THEN HE WOULD RETURN TO HIS PROSPECTING. IT WAS SAID LOBENZO WAS A AMBI-TIONS MAN AND LIKED TO BE SLLF SUPPORTING. HE WOULD CARPY HIS PROVISIONS ON HIS SHOULDER THREE MILES SOUTH EAST OF MONA. AFTER A BRIEF HILMESS LORENZO DIED AT THE MOME OF HIS NIECE SYMANTHA TATES. HE DIED 16 MARCH 1903. HE WAS BURIED AT THE POOT OF WOUNT NEBO, THE MOUNTAIN HE LOVED SO WELL, IN THE MONA COMETERY. HIS HEAD STONE INSCRIPTION READS AS FOLLOWS:

"LORENZO BABGOCK FERNDARY 23, 1823, MARCH 16, 1903, MEMBER OF THE MORMON BATTAL-ION, ERECTED BY THE DAUGHTERS OF THE UTAH PIONEERS." LORENZO HAD LIVED A GOOD LIFE, HE LEFT A GOOD FAMILY HERE OF EARTH TO CARRY ON.
